Confederation of Iranian Students (CIS)



Confederation of Iranian Students has created a new chapter to assist the students efforts to increase the public awareness for promotion of democracy and human rights in Iran. After the 1979 Islamic revolution, "Confederation of Iranian Students" is the largest independent student movement group that is active inside and outside of Iran.

The main objective of this organization is to empower the will and the confidence of the Iranian people, create team work, and teach the skills for non violent movement to resist against the dictatorship regime in Iran.

Iran has a population of about 70 million people. About 70% of this population is under the age of 35 years. ¹

Iran has about 2 million college students and 18 million students from first grade to the twelfth grade. ²

"Confederation of Iranian Students" is a combination of federations in different countries around the world that reaches out to the students through social, cultural, artistic, literature, and sports activities.

Federation of Iran

Currently, the Confederation of Iranian Students has over 4000 members inside Iran. The coordinating committee that is comprised of one hundred people have been selected to take the lead for the confederation.

The following members are some of the key members for the coordinating committee of the confederation.

one of the founders of Confederation who is sentenced to 15 years of jail.

Iranian Federation has members in different colleges of Iran in numerous cities.

These members have created research groups to inform and educate other students. Some of their activities include scientific, political, and social seminars.



These students also conduct research on a number of topics.

One of the major responsibilities of this group is to get the latest news and information from their colleges and distribute them to the international media outside of Iran. This information is also shared among NGOs and human rights groups.



These students also hold book readings and poetry sessions.

Federation of England

Mostafa Sanatnama, (Saman), 24 years old, student, majoring in Civil Engineering leads the highly active team for Federation of England.



He believes there is an apathy among young people for politics. He believes in order to reach out to the young



people, you need to find innovative ways. Some of his ideas to lead his team is to use social, artistic, and sports activities to attract young people.

Mostafa is also a member of the Iranian Enterprise Institute. (IEI)

He took part in the US International Visitors Leadership Program in Sept-Oct 2006. This was the first group of Iranian nationals to take part in this program after 27 years.

He was an active participant in the student demonstration on 11th June 2003 in Iran and has staged a hunger strike for four days in front of Iran Embassy in London.

In the UK, Mostafa acts as the director and the public outreach for all the projects for Federation of England.

Sasan Kasmai is the founder of Soccer Team in London, called Confederation of Iranian Students Football Club (CISFC).

Federation of Germany

Director of Federation of Germany, Sohrab Khoshbouei, (Saman), 29 years old, is one of the key member of the 1999 student movement in Iran.



He and his family has been a victim of Islamic Republic tortures and executions. Three of his brothers, Gholamali, 24, Cyrus, 20, Sasan ,18, were executed by Islamic Republic of Iran. Siavash, his other brother at the age of 12 was sentenced to six years

in jail where he spent one year in solitary confinement.

His mother, Fatemeh was also a political prisoner for five years.

Sohrab at the age of 4 and his sister at the age of 3 both spent two years in jail with their mother. His other sisters, Soosan, 17, and Saeideh, 15, were sentenced to jail for more than five years. One of Sohrab's sister inlaw was executed, and his other sister in-law spent five years in jail.

Sohrab Khoshbouei, is in charge of designing the graphics and the website of the confederation. He is the creator and the designer of all the publishing work related to the confederation. Currently Sohrab and his wife, Fateneh Eftekhari, are living in Germany as a political refugee for the past 19 month.

Two other active members in Germany include Mohammad Shams,



electrical engineer, and Javad Assadian,



writer, and poet are both key advisors to the confederation.




Federation of France

Confederation of Iranian Students supports Nazanin Afshin-Jam's human rights activities. We also support her efforts to bring the Iranian opposition group leaders together.






